A Message from the Executive Director

- The OCRRA Budget for 2008 charts a plan for many changes and improvements. For several years, we have explored program models to deliver additional environmental services to the In September 2007, OCRRA opened a new community. Community Collection Center to migrate away from one-day event style collections to permanent drop-off opportunities. In the beginning, the Community Collection Center is serving the public with a convenient outlet for book and battery recycling, blue bin and recycling information, and a place to capture lamps, cell phones, and smoke detectors for recycling or proper disposal. 2008 marks the first full year of operations for the center. The Five-Year Capital Plan that is part of the 2008 Budget also envisions the purchase and development of a more comprehensive collection center in 2010 if the program is the success we anticipate. In a nutshell, the Community Collection Center typifies the OCRRA Budget - an accurate annual forecast of operations, an environmental benefit for the community, and a long-range Capital Plan to make pilot programs permanent as success takes hold.
- OCRRA's Budget is developed through accurate forecasting by the management team. Those plans and forecasts were reviewed at multiple (at least 8) committee meetings of the full Board. Every one of the meetings was open to the public and the Budget was advertised and available for public comment before its adoption. Additional improvements were made to the 2008 document to improve readability and transparency. This is a Budget for a public agency, developed with the public in mind.

- The 2008 Budget adopts only one fee change. The disposal fee for trash goes up \$2.00 per ton to \$65.00 in 2008. All other fees for 2008 remain the same, including the fees for construction debris, roofing materials, appliances, and compost which OCRRA reduced in 2007. Revenues for 2008 reflect the modest increase in the trash disposal fee, but also anticipate less tonnage in 2008. We forecast tonnage to be down as the BlueBinIt recycling harvests more recyclables from the trash. Also, tonnage is forecast to be down slightly due to potential economical cooling in the retail and residential construction sectors of the economy.
- The expenses for 2008 reflect the inflationary impacts of our time: galloping fuel costs and health insurance expenses, and very moderate increases in most other areas. I salute the managers and the Board for their sincere actions to trim expenses and still keep OCRRA on course to provide excellent environmental service.
- OCRRA's commitment to public education continues with its exciting and action-provoking BlueBinIt Campaign begun in 2007 and continuing in 2008.
- We anticipate 2008 to be another year of great environmental performance. We adopt an Operations Plan and a Capital Plan which recognizes and looks forward to opportunities and changes.

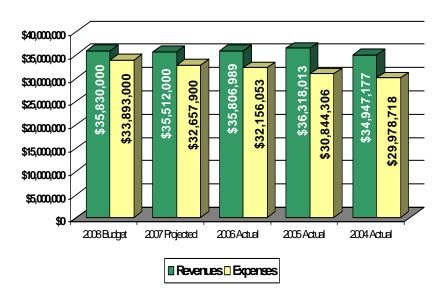

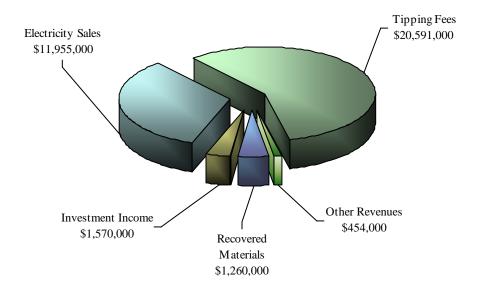
